You can partner with your friends to welcome people from around the world to Wisconsin even if you don't host or day host, although we encourage you to do so if you can. Simply attend events when we have guests and take the time to talk to them. One of my most cherished friends was not someone I hosted or who hosted me but was an ambassador I met while day hosting. Friendship Force has really changed my perception of the world. It feels like a smaller place. When I read about tensions, joys, good news and bad around the world, it is easier to put it all into perspective. We also can share our experiences and perspectives with friends and family and impact their perceptions and understanding of events.

Our guests are a group of academic women who are committed to help young women and girls in Russia enter into STEM (science, technology, engineering & math) fields and foster gender equity. In Madison they will meet with government officials, educators, businesswomen and community groups who are working toward the same goal. You can meet them at a potluck on March 8th and learn about the program that we have developed for the delegation. **Please come! Bring food! Guests are welcome.**

The snapper turtle dinners were a hit and today draw diners from a 60-mile radius. Turtle is so popular that last year they began offering turtle on Wednesday's in addition to Friday during Lent. A 20-21 pound turtle yields about seven pounds of meat.

The Friendship Force of Wisconsin - Madison, Inc. Annual Meeting Minutes - April 7, 2019 Zor Shrine Center

The meeting was called to order by President Peg Hutnik at 1:03 pm. Peg mentioned that the minutes of last year's meeting and the treasurer's report were on the tables. She announced that the out-going international trip for 2020 will be to New Caledonia and Christchurch, New Zealand in April. She has spoken with a club on the North Island and we will be able to extend for a few days with them. The ballots for the election of the officers for 2020 were also on the tables, and the members were asked to mark their ballots.

Peg then introduced the current board, committee chairs, and newsletter editor. Peg reminded the members that the minutes from 2018 were on the tables. George Wysock moved to accept the minutes from 2018, seconded by Dan Eggerding, motion carried.

Treasurer's report was on the tables, and there were no questions, additions or discussion. The report was accepted as presented.

President's report. Peg presented a detailed report of the accomplishments this past year starting with the board retreat in July 2018. There we set goals for 2019: to increase membership; increase journey participation both as ambassadors and hosts; increase interest in the club through activities. During the summer there were several activities planned in anticipation of the Japan journey. The Indonesia club came in February to experience snow. The Niagara Club was here in July and we had our annual picnic with them.

We hosted two Open World programs; the group from Georgia was in September 2018 and the group from Russia was in March 2019. The theme for both was on communications, news media, and politics. Sandi Wysock led both groups.

Current membership is 120 which is down a bit from last year when we had 145. There were 30 potential new members that signed up at the International Fest in February. The membership committee will follow up with orientation/informational meetings in the next few weeks.

Gail Holmes and the Activities committee has been busy with Second Harvest Food Bank, Let's Hike, Bike rides, LEO's, highway clean-up, book club, and the WHA auction. Donna Hussin is planning a day trip to Kenosha Civil War Museum and electric streetcar experience on June 19 and a trip to a cranberry marsh in the fall.

Agnes Rona is the new editor of the newsletter which will now be published on a bi-monthly basis.

One of our goals this year has been to move toward more effective management and more technology. The website is now functioning well.

Tom Miller and the outreach committee has been busy with the international Fest in February and a Speech to the Wisconsin Heights Optimist club in Mazomanie in December.

The in-bound journeys for 2019 will be Medicine Hat Canada from July 2-9 and Aichi Japan from September 11-18. The outbound journey will be two weeks in Australia in October. The international Conference will be in Boulder Colorado from July 23-27. This will be at the University of Colorado at Boulder. The workshops are listed on the FFI website. Members are encouraged to attend and there are several scholarships available. The cost for registration and housing is \$500.00.


