A NOTE FROM THE PRESIDENT

It seems like the Regional Conference was months ago, but it was just in April. This conference was considered a Super Regional Conference because it included clubs from the Midwest Region plus the Great Lakes Region and the Southwest. We had representatives from Wichita, New Orleans, Austin, Kentucky, and Michigan to name a few. It was great to meet so many new members but at the same time I missed having time with the Midwest clubs that we interact with on a more frequent basis.

One of the documents presented to the group was an Overview of the Characteristics of a Healthy Friendship Force Club. Many clubs are static. They are not growing but are managing to maintain current membership. Some are in decline meaning they cannot find leaders and are aging. Given our growth and level of activities we are considered one of the more successful clubs and we tend to have characteristics similar to most successful clubs. We have a conventional style of leadership (president, vice president etc.) Most healthy clubs have memberships of 70 - 100 or more. We have 141. Word of mouth continues to be the tried and true method of recruiting. Most successful Western clubs have an average age of around 60 and are trying to encourage younger recruits. A strong social activities calendar is important. There were a number of innovative ideas around hosting. Everything from co-hosting to assigning journey tasks rather than seeking volunteers, to using completely unstructured days to requiring members to fill out a sheet at the beginning of the year indicating which journeys they would be able to host, dinner host, co-host, day host etc. All in all, it seemed to me that we can be proud of where we are at. If we continue to grow, be flexible and adapt to changing times we will continue to thrive. As always our success really is a reflection of the work that you do for Friendship Force of Wisconsin-Madison. Thank you for supporting our journeys and contributing your time and talents.

Super Regional Conference April 20-21, 2018

Journeys of the Future (Report from one of the sessions)

One of the handouts at the Super Regional Conference discussed journeys of the future. There is a commitment to retain our signature home hospitality but there is room for innovation in programming and a number of clubs are experimenting with more flexible concepts that make it easier for working couples to host and provide more flexibility. There is a move toward more unstructured time and true cultural experiences versus touring.

Some of the suggestions include: More physical activities or a combination of more and less physical activities within the same journey. Several clubs are taking a break from hosting by providing a two day experience away from the host family. In Vancouver, for example, ambassadors often go to Victoria for two days mid-journey. Many ambassadors would like more free time with their hosts to explore their own interests or simply experience the simple things like shopping, gardening, a walk in the neighborhood, a visit with family or friends, a simple meal with their host family, a hike in a park or biking. Baby boomers in general prefer less structure, a less rigid agenda and less formality. Understand that we are mission based-not a travel in more humanitarian and community activities. These are attractive to the boomers and younger generations. Themed journeys focusing on a specific interest build strong friendships because of the shared interest. Allow ambassadors a day on their own to explore. For example, we might let them explore State Street on their own without us hovering and without a requirement that they rush through to the next tour location.

As you can see, there are many ideas floating around and probably no right answer that fits every club. What is clear is that we should develop a more flexible approach to our programs to make it easier for working couples to participate and that more flexible programming will be necessary as we move to the next generation.
