A NOTE FROM THE PRESIDENT



Second Harvest Foodbank Service Project Volunteer- Monday, July 30, 2018

In May 2017, as part of the San Diego Journey activities, we participated in a half-day service project at the Second Harvest Foodbank. We had such a satisfying experience and a feeling of accomplishment in sorting packages of frozen meat. The Board had approved adding Second Harvest to our outreach opportunities, but it languished among other projects of the Activities Committee.

Now Gail Holmes has volunteered to arrange for our club to begin participation in the work of the Foodbank which aids local hunger-related charities. Our first opportunity will be on **Monday, July 30, from 12:30 to 3:30** p.m. As volunteers, we will be getting food and other products ready for distribution to the partner agencies--food pantries, shelters, meal sites, etc. Our tasks may include sorting, labeling, packaging food into family-friendly portions, and cleaning the work area following the project.

Here is information I asked Second Harvest to provide:

Did you know one in six children under the age of 18 and one in 10 people overall in our area struggle with hunger? You can make a difference in their lives by volunteering at Second Harvest Foodbank! Maybe you'll sort eggs into cartons. Maybe you'll add ingredient labels to packaged frozen pizzas. Maybe you'll scoop rice into family-friendly two pound bags. The foods at Second Harvest are too numerous to list, but these tasks remain the same - sorting, labeling, and packaging. Yerkes Observatory, Williams Bay & East Troy Electric Railroad Motor Coach Day Tour, May 23, 2018

The sun was out on May 23 when we boarded the coach to the Yerkes Observatory. We welcomed a few members of the UW Alumni Association on board too. After a ride south on I-90 and across country to Williams Bay, we arrived at the observatory. Our tour guide presented a short history of the observatory and a lesson on the physics of lenses before going in to see the telescope. Yerkes Observatory was built in 1897 under the direction of astronomer George Hale of the University of Chicago. He obtained funding from a financier named Yerkes. The observatory is home to a 40-inch refracting telescope which is the world's largest refracting telescope. Edwin Hubble and Carl Sagan both studied there. The University of Chicago will be closing the observatory in October of 2018. The volunteers at Yerkes are working to obtain funding to support the facility and continue their STEM programs with elementary and high school students. We all enjoyed the architecture, the figures of the architect (proving the size of his ego) and zodiac signs carved onto the limestone pillars and gargoyles.

Then it was on to East Troy where we visited the electric railroad depot and museum. We boarded the train and chose seats at dining tables elegantly set with table cloths and our first course salad. The main course was pork medallions with apricot sauce, twice baked potatoes and spring vegetables. During the trip our conductor provided an entertaining history of the electric railroad, lessons on train jargon, and train culture. The railroad is run by an all-volunteer staff who enjoy railroads. The train moved along the route at 5 miles per hour so that our meal would not be upset by When we reached Indian Head Park in the movement. Mukwonago, we could leave the train for a short break while the conductor moved the tail to the other end of the train and we could return to East Troy. Dessert of apple crumble was served on the return trip. The best part of the whole trip is that we celebrated Dick and Bea Hayden's 65th wedding anniversary with candles and song. Many thanks to Gail Holmes and Donna Hussin for planning the trip and keeping us on schedule.

The Friendship Force of Wisconsin - Madison, Inc. Annual Meeting Minutes - April 29, 2018 Radisson Hotel

The meeting was called to order by President Sandi Wysock at 1:20 pm. A quorum was present. She thanked everyone who helped organize the meeting, the Board members for serving, and introduced new members and guests attending the meeting.

Ballots were at the tables, members were asked to vote, and the ballots were collected by nominating committee members. Some absentee ballots had also been received and were counted in the total. Ballots were counted while the meeting proceeded. The nominating committee consisted of Sandi Wysock, Lise Skofronick, Sandy Drew, and Mary Lou Martino.

Janet Lonergan moved the minutes from last year be approved as submitted (printed in the April newsletter). The motion was seconded and approved. Martha McGregor moved that the Treasurer's report be accepted as presented (available on the tables). It was seconded and approved.

Sandi gave a detailed report on accomplishments of the past year. Our outbound journey this past year was to Medicine Hat, Canada (led by Peg Hutnik assisted by Donna Hussin). We received incoming groups from New Caledonia (led by Dan Eggerding assisted by Lise Skofronick), San Diego (led by Donna Hussin and Gail Holmes), Indonesia (led by Doug and Kathy Johnson). Several new activities were incorporated into these journeys which were enjoyed by guests and provided variety for the hosts as well. Our Indonesian group came to experience winter and had a wonderful time. We were also able to secure an Open World delegation of young professionals from Ukraine studying media processes in the US (led by Sandi Wysock and Sandy Drew). All of these incoming groups provided lots of opportunities for home hosting, the heart of Friendship Force.

We have another upcoming inbound journey scheduled for June from Niagara, Canada (led by Lise Skofronick and George Wysock). Plans are also progressing for our upcoming outbound journey to Japan (led by Kathy Speck and Magdi Sebestyen) which still has a few openings. Several workshops are planned to explore Japanese culture and everyone is invited to participate in these events - watch the newsletter. We hope to be awarded another Open World group.

As of January 1, we added 33 new members and now have a total of 131 club members, up from 124 last year. One of our major efforts this year was to recruit new members at our 40th Anniversary event. Twenty people signed up that day and others have joined throughout the year. Kathy Speck and the membership committee did an outstanding job on this event. We need this growth in order to have sufficient people to support all of our programs and activities. Many clubs in the US as well as Europe are suffering declining membership as people age and health issues arise which limit their participation. We are finally turning this trend around in our club having added 57 members in the past three years. Networking and friend recommendations continue to be our best source of new members, so keep up the good work.

As we gather new members, changes will inevitably come along - more tech savvy people who want to interact in different ways; people who are still working and will need to find ways to participate around working hours and who will require more help to host; and a wider variety of social activities will need to be planned to keep everyone involved. We have developed a mentoring program to make certain that we integrate our new members effectively into the club.

As you probably know, our website was hacked this past year. We took advantage of this opportunity to change to a new platform that will offer us more flexibility going forward. Al Rieland, Dan Eggerding and Dave Dohler led the effort to make this happen. We are using Facebook as well as Eventbrite and you will be able to sign up to participate and in the future pay for events on-line using credit cards.

We continue to work on developing connections with other groups in the community such as Sister Cities and Rotary and develop ongoing professional presentations. We've also purchased some new display materials. FFI is working to help local clubs increase their marketing and PR skills.

Last year, the Board developed some strategic plans and developed a vision for 2022 that includes growth, diversity, mentoring, having a variety educational, social and service experiences, managing our club's affairs efficiently and effectively, as well as continuing our global cultural journey experiences.

There were a couple of announcements about FFI: the next International Conference cannot be held in Puerto Rico as was originally planned and will be held in Boulder, CO in July of 2019 and the annual affiliation dues will be raised by \$5 per person in 2020 for the first time in 7 years. This necessitate our Board reviewing our own dues policy.

Sandi also thanked everyone for being a part of her "tribe" and for allowing her to be president of this group for the past two plus years - an honor and a privilege.

Lise Skofronick of the Nominating Committee reported the results of the vote. The officers for next year beginning in September will be: Peg Hutnik, President; Kathy Speck, Vice President; Martha Mc Gregor, Secretary; and May Juckem, Treasurer.

Sandi thanked those who served who are no longer on the Board: Lise Skofronick (outreach); Jane Kessenick (activities); Mary Lindquist (membership); Sandy Drew (vice-president). She thanked all of the journey coordinators (listed above and in the program) as well as day hosts, drivers, dinner hosts, bakers, highway pickup participants, and WHA auction participants. She also reminded members of those we lost in the past year: Eleanor Loree Davies, Barbara Infield, and Lois Hinhede. Long time members were all recognized on the program.

Sandi then shared with everyone journey assignments for 2019. We will have an incoming group from Medicine Hat, Canada; an incoming group from Aichi, Japan; and our outbound journey will be two weeks in Australia on the Central Coast and in Tweed Valley.

Signups are available following the meeting for participating in our next highway cleanup, the WHA auction, dinner hosting or day hosting for the incoming group from Niagara, and the bus trip to Yerkes Observatory and the East Troy Electric Railroad with gourmet lunch included.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:00 pm.
