On Saturday, August 18, we will visit one of Wisconsin's most beautiful parks: Devil's Lake State Park. This will be a bit more challenging hike, but it is well worth it. We will start from the

South Shore, heading to the North Shore via East Bluff Trail, which means climbing up to Balanced Rock, and then enjoying spectacular views from the bluffs overlooking the lake below. Be prepared for rocky terrain, and about 500 ft. elevation on a steep trail. Hiking boots are recommended! We can have lunch on the North Shore beach, and then head back to our cars by walking south along the lakeshore. Expect a total of about 4-5 Miles of hiking/walking.

Topic: Urban Planning/Environmental Planning/Clean Air

Open World is a Congressional program administered by the Open World Leadership Center which is an independent government agency of the United Sates Congress. The program is targeted toward young professionals who are primarily from Eastern Europe. The program builds the groundwork for enduring cooperation by bringing emerging government and civic leaders to the United States to work with their American counterparts during 10-day professional visits and facilitates continued relations through an alumni network and social media. OWLC awards grants to U.S. non-profit and educational organizations, who partner with community-based civic and service organizations to provide local hosting and programming for the delegates. The home hosting provides the delegates with a glimpse of life in the United States and the professional programming provides them with peer connections that serve as a foundation for an ongoing partnerships. OWLC has hosted over 27,000 delegates in all 50 states since 1999.

Friendship Force of Wisconsin-Madison is honored to be one of the clubs selected to receive a grant to host an OWLC program. Our delegates from Georgia will arrive in Washington D.C. on the September 6. After an orientation and a whirlwind tour, they will fly to Wisconsin. We are charged with developing 32 hours of programming and also providing home hosting and cultural experiences. Based on past experience, this will likely be the first time that any of these delegates have visited the United States. They are young, passionate, dedicated new leaders. I am sure you will be impressed when you meet them. **Please join us in welcoming our delegates from Georgia!** We will have a potluck welcome dinner on Sunday night September 9. Join us for our upcoming two part workshop on Japanese art history, language and culture.

Part 1: Japanese Art History presented by Holly Rubalcava, PhD candidate, Department of Art History and Graduate

Public Humanities Exchange Scholar, Center for the Humanities at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Ms. Rubalcava has vast knowledge of Japanese art history, spent considerable time in Japan, and taught Arts of Japan in fall 2017 at UW-Madison. The workshop will provide a brief introduction to the visual culture of Japan, including painting, sculpture, woodblock prints, architecture and gardens. It will also focus on the arts and practices related to Shinto and Buddhism.

Part 2: Japanese Language and Culture presented by Takako Nakakubo, Faculty Associate, Department of Asian Languages and Cultures at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Ms. Nakakubo earned her Ph.D. in Second Language Acquisition from the University of Iowa. She has been teaching Japanese for over twenty years at various universities and colleges in the United States and Japan.

The workshop will include basic Japanese greetings and other useful expressions as well as etiquette that Japan visitors will find useful when interacting with people in Japan.

Join us in welcoming our Open World delegates from Georgia. These young leaders are here to learn more about the United States and to connect with other professionals in Urban Planning/Environment/Clean Air. Because they will be involved in professional programing during much of the week, this may be your only opportunity to have a conversation with them. Please plan on joining us and giving our delegates a big Wisconsin Welcome!

Georgia is located on the black sea, in Caucasus, bordering with Russia, Azerbaijan, Armenia and Turkey. The territory of Georgia is about 70, 000 square kilometers with 310-km long coastline. The country is largely mountainous with Greater Caucasus Mountains in the north and Lesser Caucasus Mountains in the south. The climate is quite diverse - from humid subtropical to continental. Diversity of landscape makes the land attractive for human settlements. Traditional drivers of economy are agriculture and tourism. Georgia is a country of old history and culture. The first Georgian State was founded about 1000 years B. C. Tbilisi has been the capital of Georgia since the fifth Century. It is situated on the both sides of the Mtkvari River, in the intermountain depression between the Greater and Lesser Caucasus, and covers an area of 350 square kilometers. Tbilisi is a large administrative, educational and cultural centre. Previously it was a large industrial center as well. Other large cities in Georgia are: Kutaisi, Rustavi, Batumi, Sokhumi, Gori, Poti, Zugdidi, and Telavi.
