Turkey Part III The Tour

Our 10-day tour begins with appreciative hugs and farewells with our Urla hosts. Then it's a relatively long 4-hour ride on a nice coach. Our Neon tour guide gives us much information on the way; traditions, calls to prayer, population, industries, agriculture, taxes, medical care, etc. Side trip to Camlik Village where we observe local women weaving carpets. Very tedious and beautiful. After check in at our hotel in Bodrum, we go for a swim in the Mediterranean, now further south and even warmer than the Aegean. Some do the Turkish Bath at the hotel.

A dairy cooperative was visited and we observed the packaging of a yogurt drink. This was a very large coop with trucks collecting milk in 80 villages from very small producers, but resulting in a total collection of 25 tons of milk per day.

At Pamukkale we are amazed by the beautiful white terraces and pools that have been formed when water from the hot springs loses carbon dioxide as it flows down the slopes, leaving deposits of white calcium carbonate. Quite a spectacle! Most of us waded in the pools. Later at the hotel we were able to enjoy the thermal spa.

This was the harvest time for cotton, sugar beets, onions and tomatoes and we see many laborers in the fields and trucks on the road transporting those crops. We even stopped at a cotton field and were able to feel and pick off some cotton balls.

Another school visit allowed us to observe kindergarten classes and very eager 5-year-olds in striking red uniforms offered us gifts of their artwork. Then an English (Turkey's second language) class of eighth graders allowed for some speaking interaction. A delightful experience for both students and Ambassadors. The Antalya Archeological Museum provided glimpses into Turkey's early history – many thousands of years, earning it the title, Cradle of Civilization. At Perge we view the well-preserved and renovated ruins of a civilization from around 1500 BC and are amazed at the archaeological achievements that were possible at that time. Since we are still at the seacoast in Antalya, we have our last chance for a swim in the Mediterranean.

Now to the northeast through the Taurun Mountains, but also view many fields of onions, sugar beets, anis and sesame. We also come through the area of the first organized city in the world, Catalhoyuk. In the Konya area we attended a performance of the "Whirling Dervishes" in an underground cave. This is a mystic religious group actually banned in 1925. But performers continue the spinning, ballet like ceremony in long white robes to the delight of their audiences.

In the Cappadocia area we visited the Goreme Open-Air Museum, a very large area of volcanic rock with properties conducive to carving. There is a great concentration of caves including churches, monasteries and dwellings. Early Christians actually lived in the caves for long periods, hiding from the Roman conquerors. In several areas we see massive smooth rock pointed formations (fairy chimneys) some of which also had caves, some natural and some chiseled out. We visit studios for pottery and onyx manufacturing and are amazed to see demonstrations of how beautiful pieces evolve under the hands of skilled craftsmen.

A tour of the self sustaining underground city of Kaymakli was exciting as well as claustrophobic for some, since we could barely get through some of the tunnels with narrow and steep passageways; hard to imagine thousands of people living here from the 6th to 9th centuries, often staying underground in the eight level complex for months at a time.

On the way to Ankara the capitol, we learned how Mustafa Kemal led the revolution against occupying forces from WWI, eventually becoming the first president of the new Turkish Republic in 1923. He became known as the Father of Modern Turkey and was called Ataturk. His reforms provided the basis for the modern, secular society enjoyed by the Turkish today. We see his picture everywhere. The ride to Ankara was long, but we did have some time at the Anatolian Civilizations Museum housing a very impressive collection of artifacts going back to 1200 BC. The previous name of the city was Angora – you may recall the name associated with the exceptional quality wool.

We flew from Ankara to Istanbul (name officially changed from Constantinople in 1930) avoiding the 6-hour bus ride and giving us more time to see the many sights in this great city. Highlights the Topkapi Palace - including the harem, the Hippodrome - an arena seating 60,000 for chariot races and all types of entertainment, the Blue Mosque - so called due to 20,000 tiles that give it the blue appearance, the Yildiz Palace - used by a series of Sultans, the Underground Cistern - in ancient times the water reservoir for the city, the Grand Bazaar - buy anything there, the Spice Bazaar – 30 different varieties, and a cruise on the Bosphouus. Our last night we enjoyed a fine (lamb featured) dinner and a traditional Turkish show of folkloric dances and belly dancers – unforgettable moves. Return flight to Chicago the next day was comfortable and without incident. One more bus ride back to Madison and then it was "Welcome Home" from members.
