A note from the President

We have completed our first inbound exchange of the year which included 27 ambassadors from clubs in Washington and Missouri. A bus was rented and we took the visitors to all the local attractions we could fit in during their stay. They really enjoyed traveling in the bus and seeing our area. I hope you had a chance to meet them during some of the activities. Next month we will host the group from Peru. I believe the number of ambassadors involved will be about nine. The Peruvians will be at the Summer Pig roast in July. Be sure to sign up so you can meet them.

Pat Meyer our FF Midwest Regional Representative has made a proposal to the club presidents to coordinate our exchange requests to Atlanta. This approach would help avoid duplicate destination assignments within the Midwest. (i.e. this year the FFW and another club in the Midwest were both assigned Indonesia.) The second problem addressed is filling exchanges. The Midwest appears to have four clubs, Madison, Milwaukee, Lincoln, and Chicago that fill their exchanges from within their own clubs. The other nine clubs are currently attracting 6 to 10 ambassadors from their own clubs. At least one club in the Midwest has had to cancel an exchange because they had fewer than 5 ambassadors. If the exchanges are coordinated the hope is we will be more easily able to fill exchanges. The six clubs in the Florida Region have coordinated their requests to guarantee that no two Florida clubs are assigned the same destination. If we participate in this program we will have to give Pat Meyer our out bound exchange preferences by the end of August. This all sounds like a very logical approach to the problem.

We are looking for EDs for next year. We are in need of outgoing EDs for the incoming Turkish exchange, an outgoing Oregon Exchange, and an outgoing Indonesian Exchange. If you have and interest please let us know.

We boarded a Lazer bus for a day at Dubuque, Iowa on Saturday. We toured the National Mississippi River Museum and Aquarium, had a buffet lunch on a Mississippi River boat cruise, and optional time in the afternoon to return to the museum, ride the trolley to Dubuque's downtown, or visit the casino. Homehosted dinners were enjoyed that evening.

Sunday was a day with your host or a guided tour of Olbrich Botanical Gardens. Limited seating was on the three pontoon boats departing from the Yahara River, going through the locks, around Lake Mendota, and back through the locks to Lake Monona. The Friendship Force Newsletter

Bernie Long helped to locate the following information about the history of the Friendship Force Newsletter. This is a brief outline:

In 1980 the Friendship Force Office was at 2001 W. Beltline Hwy. The office space was provided by David Carman. At that same time, Catherine Garst was the office manager. Sid Talbot worked in the office as well as other volunteers. The Newsletter was produced, printed and mailed from the office.

The Jan. 4 1983 issue of the FF Newsletter contained this paragraph: Appreciation to Dave Carman

"Once again it is time to give our appreciation to Dave Carman. He has so generously given office space to the Friendship Force now beginning our 4th year. Our sincere thanks, Dave Carman and Associates."

Catherine Garst was still office manager and Sid Talbot seemed to be spending the most time in the office. Bill Erickson was running off the label list. In March 1985 Virginia Salisbury and Lois Parsons were secretary. They may have been producing the Newsletter on office machines.

From March 1989 to August 1990 the computer typesetting and design was by Spectrum Communications. Sid Talbot and other board members submitted and composed the material. When Sid resigned, Margo took over the composition of the newsletter and typing on her Selectric typewriter. I began working with Margo in November of 1990 then; a few months later began the set up with my computer. The exchange directors and others provided the articles to be included in the newsletter.

During this time Margo Lindl, the Artz's, Lois Parsons and Frank Lindl were doing the labeling and mailing of the newsletters. Others have helped with Mary & Gary presently doing it.

I have enjoyed the challenge of producing the newsletter for The Friendship Force since 1991. It now is time for someone new to provide and share their ideas.

Oh, What Fun!

A few years ago as a new member of Friendship Force, I signed up for the Mystery Exchange to St. Louis with a courageous spirit of adventure. On the train I did not know the people in my group and did not know where I was going. I was hosted by Dorothee Elowe, another stranger, who chose me as an ambassador because I indicated in my application that I spoke French. It did not take Dorothee and me very long to discover that our families had probably known one another in Quebec City in the 1600s when the city was new. We bonded not as much as host and ambassador but more like long lost cousins who share the same culture and roots.

Excited that the St. Louis FF was coming to Madison, I requested that I be her host. We picked up our friendship without missing a beat where we had left off three years ago. We slid from English to French with comfort and ease.

As a 21 year old, Dorothee had stepped of the train in Madison in 1951 in order to attend UW's graduate school. She spoke only French but could read English. She had walked to the YWCA for that first night and then set out to find housing but couldn't remember what she had done with her suitcase, ice skates and skis. I wanted to retrace those steps for her once again. Our initial nostalgic tour began at the train depot on W Washington, the YWCA on the Capitol square, the house on W. Washington that she and her newlywed husband, Louis, had rented during their three year stay here. We were unable to find the old School of Pharmacy or the Heart Institute where she had worked or the graduate housing that she had remembered on University Ave.

Babcock ice cream was enjoyed in the Memorial Union. She remembered the familiar Rathskellar with smiles but commented that it did not smell of beer as she had recalled. I pointed out that the students were drinking their beer outside on this beautiful, warm summer night while listening to music on the terrace. I was not able to accompany her to Baraboo but she was delighted to be able to return to the Dells where she and her husband to be had had their first date.

Our second campus exploration took us to the parking lots and back areas of the older buildings as we looked for the buildings that she remembered. Finally, we found the new School of Pharmacy which is housed in a beautiful new high rise. Dorothee got out of the car to photograph the Rennebohm building with joy. The hosting experience was so much fun for me. Rekindling a new friendship and watching Dorothee revive her Madison memories was great. So was the socializing at the welcome and farewell dinners, the hosted dinner in the Carsten's home, the bus rides, reviving friendships with the St. Louis club members, and making new friends with the Oregon ambassadors. I'm looking forward to my next hosting experience in August.
