Berlin Exchange with Extension to Poland May 15-June 1, 2014

"All is well that ends well" describes our trip.

The exchange to Berlin, Germany, started on Friday, May 16, 2014, when most of the ambassadors met their hosts. The three travelers from Huntsville, Alabama, were not so lucky. The first leg of their flight was cancelled, and rebooking was complicated. One went through Paris and arrived a day late, halfway through the welcome dinner. The other two were sent via Istanbul, Turkey, and arrived two days later. All three were exhausted but showed a cheerful spirit.

We were home-hosted for six nights until the morning of May 22. As usual there were a variety of lodging situations and distances to the start of events. Berlin is a large and spread- out city. For example, we had a 20 minute walk to the nearest subway or bus station. The dense traffic caused some late arrivals at meeting points.

Our week started with an interesting lecture about Germany's road to democracy at the German Cathedral, then a four-hour sightseeing tour by bus, and finally the Welcome Party. We were treated to an abundance of German foods and libations in a lovely community room well decorated by their committee. A good number of the Berlin Club members attended. We presented our gifts, the pictorial books on Madison and Wisconsin along with our club pin and the cross-flag pin, to Hans-Holger Schroeter-Oestrich, ED, and Gloria Stark, club president. Lively conversations lasted into the evening.

The rest of the week followed the program prepared by the Berlin ED. It included a combination of guided and self-guided tours with a heavy dose of history. Some of the major sites were Checkpoint Charlie and nearby museum featuring ways people escaped from East Berlin, the Wall Memorial, all five museums on the Museum Island, a walk in the park of Charlottenburg Castle, a boat ride, Old Berlin to see the exterior of the Reichstag, the Brandenburg Gate, etc. There was no Farewell dinner, which was fine with everyone as we had to rise early to catch our train to Poland.

Two events will be etched in our minds forever. The first happened on our way to Checkpoint Charlie. Gail Holmes tripped as she was crossing the street and fell. Her hosts and Lise took her in a taxi to the hospital where she received expedient and attentive care. She broke her humerus near her shoulder and the X-ray showed other damage. She was advised to stay there to receive further treatment or to return home ASAP. She opted to go home. Travel Guard Insurance was contacted and plans were made for her to fly back – a long and complex process.

Our next medical issue was Lise who woke up the next day with excruciating pain to her lower back. She was unable to get out of bed. Her host quickly called for a doctor to come to the house. Three hours later an amiable young physician arrived, administered several injections in the painful area and prescribed some strong pain killers. By the next morning, Lise was able to rejoin the group. From that point on everyone was very kind, carrying her bags, helping her up and down the stairs, etc.

On Thursday morning, May 22nd, we boarded the train for Poznan, Poland. After three hours, we were greeted by our tour guide Anna and our bus driver. IntoPoland proved to be excellent - caring, knowledgeable, and professional. We can only give them high praise. They provided an excellent tour at a reasonable price. The food was the best - rich and delicious - and they carefully chose menus that provided a variety of Polish dishes. No complaints about that. Many of us enjoyed local beer and some had wine.


For 11 days we visited many of the most historical cities and sites of Poland. They included Poznan, Wroclaw (pronounced Vrosuaf), Auschwitz & Birkenau, Krakow, Zakopane and the Tantra mountains, the salt mines in Wielicka, the Jasna Gora Monastery in Czestochawa, and Warsaw. Our schedule was full, the pace intense even with an occasional half day off. One evening we were treated to a piano concert of Chopin's music.

The chosen hotels were rated 3 to 4 stars, over-all centrally located, clean, comfortable, with helpful staff. There was always at least one TV station with English news and WIFI was somewhat variable.

The photographers had endless choices of wonderful sites, scenes and buildings. In time we hope they will share their bounty.

Prior to this exchange there were some concerns about blending unknown ambassadors from other clubs Every one circulated and sat with different people during meals in Poland where we had more time to get to know each other. By the end we had formed a cohesive group, made new friendships, and possibly developed some new exchange options (Medicine Hat?). We definitively see the world with new eyes.

This new initiative will retain the pillars of home hosting and hospitality that are the hallmark of Friendship Force, yet make it possible for working people to discover the Friendship Force experience.

"The best way to widen our `friendship circle' is to continue bringing down walls and building more bridges, bridges that cross language barriers, cultures, and generations. The first generation of members gave Friendship Force its global network of clubs and the baby boomers introduced the popular thematic exchanges. The Next Generation will expand that influence further. Research shows that meeting people of other cultures is the most important motivation for young travelers who seek authenticity and travel experiences that money alone cannot buy," explained CEO DiBenedetto.

The NextGen Initiative will introduce several new travel/home hosting opportunities especially designed to appeal to the interests and energy of the Next Generation.

"We cannot build this bridge alone, nor can we build it without modern tools," said DiBenedetto. New web-based tools will be introduced to make communication easier and faster. The organization is also exploring new, shorter models for home hosting. "I have gathered some of the most dynamic people I know to help with their vision, talent, and creativity," DiBenedetto noted. "I am proud to announce these two groups today."

The NextGen Council - Young leaders from 17 countries will constitute an advisory body reporting directly to the CEO. These leaders from various cultural backgrounds are ideally suited to adapt current exchange models to the interests of Next Generation travelers. They may also help connect Friendship Force to their own social networks, create and lead exchanges, as well as generate interest in Next Generation travel, home hosting, and hospitality.

The NextGen Mentors – A team of experienced leaders, from clubs in every major region of the world, who will work with Field Representatives and club executives to attract clusters of young participants from local communities, and shape travel and home hosting around their interests. Mentors are already at work preparing the launch of an information campaign. Their role is to anticipate needs, provide training and promote best practices, all hands on guidance for clubs and leaders as this new initiative is introduced.

Members of both the NextGen Council and the NextGen Mentors are outlined below. While the list of Mentors is complete, Council members will continue to be added in regions that are under-represented. Jack Mullen, Chair of the Friendship Force International Board of Directors, agrees: "Connecting people for the purpose of growing international friendships and peace is essential in today's world. It is worth every ounce of energy we have. Every age is suited for that purpose and every station in life is made richer by changing the way we see and experience the world."
