#### A NOTE FROM THE PRESIDENT

There are so many things to share, but I would like to highlight one event that is coming soon. Our club will welcome an Open World delegation from Ukraine on September 8, 2017.

The Open World Leadership Center administers the Open World Program. It is described as one of the most effective U.S. exchange programs for countries of the post-Soviet era. The program has enabled more than 25,000 current and future leaders from Azerbaijan, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Moldova, Russia, Ukraine, Tajikistan, and Turkmenistan to meaningfully engage and interact with members of Congress, congressional staff, and thousands of other Americans, many of whom are the delegates' direct professional counterparts.

The Open World delegations are highly sought after. We often have less than a day to make a decision to accept or decline an opportunity to host a delegation. If we do not accept quickly all of the opportunities are taken. This year we were fortunate enough to be offered a delegation and to receive an assignment. The topic we were given was Media Literacy and Countering False information. The program differs from our typical journeys in that there are fewer opportunities for our membership as a whole to participate. We are required to provide 32 hours of programming around the assigned topic which leaves limited time for cultural and social activities.

Our delegates arrive in less than one month. The committee has worked very hard to develop a program. There will be two opportunities for you to engage with the group. First, we are having an ice cream social on Sunday, September 10. It is an opportunity for you to meet all of the members of the delegation. Please come. Second, there will be a round table sponsored by CREECA (Center for Russian, Eastern Europe and Central Asia) in Ingraham Hall on Tuesday, September 12, from 4-5:30 p.m.. I will send you the official CREECA announcement with the time and room. I encourage all of you to come to the ice cream social and consider attending the CREECA discussion.

Finally, I want to thank the dedicated committee, Sandy Drew, Judy Taylor, Martha McGregor and Helen Ann Rugowski. In addition, thanks to those that are home hosting dinners, driving and hosting our delegates. We couldn't do this without you!

Book: <u>Putin Country: A Journey into the Real Russia</u>
Author: Anne Garrels, former foreign correspondent for NPR

Many of us have traveled to Russia. We have caught a glimpse of a large and fascinating country. Have we ever had any real understanding of the culture and society of that vast, beautiful place? Reading and discussing this book will stimulate some thoughts and more questions.

One of the saddest historic comments that I have read was about Russia in the autumn of 1611. "There was neither government of any kind, only a land laid waste and an abandoned people. Endurance is a part of the Russian character, and at the extreme of endurance lies the capacity for recovery".

Stepping into that void was 305 years of the Romanov dynasty, followed by 74 years of the Soviet Union. On Jan. 1, 1992 the Soviet Union was no more and Boris Yeltsin was president of Russia. At the end of 1999 Vladimir Putin was named president. We will talk about Putin's Russia.

Come to the book club meeting even if you haven't read the book. It will be an enjoyable discussion, and a reminder of how important it is that those being governed have a voice.
