The Friendship Force of Wisconsin was founded in 1978, is based in Madison, Wisconsin, and a member of Friendship Force International. With approximately 250 members who serve as citizen ambassadors, the club usually has two outbound and two inbound foreign exchanges each year, plus some domestic exchanges and other activities such as mystery trips and social gatherings. Our members have traveled and hosted extensively and love to meet people from throughout the world.

Madison is the capital of the state of Wisconsin and home to the University of Wisconsin, a major teaching and research university with an enrollment of over 43,000 students. The capitol building, which houses the Governor's office and the State Legislature, is situated on an isthmus between the two lakes that define downtown Madison. The city is also served by the Monona Terrace Convention Center, the Overture Center for performing arts and numerous museums and athletic venues.

Ms. Sandra Drew and Ms. Sandra Wysock are serving as the Co-Journey Directors. Ms. Drew has over 30 years' experience working for state government, with the majority of the time spent as liaison between state agencies and the Legislature, members of Congress, the Governor and organizations representing local units of government or members of the public. In addition to her professional experience, she has been active in Madison area organizations supporting women's rights, the homeless, individuals with mental illness and teaching English as a second language. She participated in four prior Open World programs that visited Madison and served as host and guest lecturer plus coordinating the program for two of the delegations. She tapped a broad network both within state government and the Madison community to create an informative and interesting program for Open World delegations.

Ms. Sandra Wysock worked for 30 years in the insurance industry with 20 years being in management positions. The majority of the time was in a position that involved interactions with a diverse agency force in four states with an emphasis on urban environments. She was active mentoring minority students and in local community groups. She currently dedicates much of her time to the Friendship Force of Wisconsin-Madison where she has been a board member for several years and is currently serving as President. She has led trips to Russia and participate in trips to Turkey, Costa Rica, Germany, England, Scotland and Romania. She also hosts Friendship Force ambassadors from around the world each year.

Dr. Jack Mitchell, Professor Emeritus, Wisconsin Public Radio Al Rieland, Director of Online Technologies Location: Conference Room, Vilas Hall, 821 University Avenue

Professor Mitchell had a 30 year career in public radio before joining the faculty of the School of Journalism and Mass Communication at the University of Wisconsin. He is the author of "Listener Supported: The Culture and History of Public Radio" in addition to numerous articles about public broadcasting. He has received two of the highest honors in public radio, the Edward R. Murrow Award and the Edward Elson National Public Radio Distinguished Service Award. Professor Mitchell will provide a tour of the Wisconsin Public Radio and Television facilities. He will describe the founding of public radio & television, how it is different from commercial radio and television, the unique role of talk radio and how the public radio and television system seeks to inform and educate its watchers and listeners. The group will also be able to meet Al Rieland, current Director of Online Technologies. Rieland will discuss current technologies used by Wisconsin Public Radio.

Its average weekday circulation is approximately 61,000, and the Sunday circulation is approximately 80,900, according to 2016 figures. This will be followed by a discussion with some of the journalists on staff and attending a meeting of the editorial staff as they evaluate various stories and select the top news stories to be featured in the following day's newspaper.
